The Top Ten Exciting Ways to STUDY for a TEST...

- 2. MAKE HEADINGS FOR INFORMATION.

Acid Rain

- 3. Ask for or create PRACTICE QUESTIONS and do them.
- Ask the teacher or look in your text book. Look at activities, homework and quizzes you did in class for direction
- 4. Make a map to help you remember information.

5. FIGURE OUT THE 5 W'J (WHO WHAT WHERE WHEN WHY) AND THE 1 H (HOW) FOR ANY CONCEPT, PERSON, OR EVENT.

What: World War II Where: Europe. When 1939-1945

Why: Hitler rose to power in Germany, broke the Treaty of Versailles, invaded Poland, ignored France and Germany's ultimatums

Who: Germany, Russia, Italy, Japan, France, Britain, Canada, etc.

How (is this important): Many Jewish people were killed, a lot of soldiers were lost, a nuclear bomb was dropped

6. Chart Important Information.

Explorer	Year	Purpose
Cartier	1534	Discover a passage to the east.
Champlain	1599	Visit West Indies

7. Make Study Cards

- on cue cards make short, point form notes on the subject.
- carry the notes around with you and look at them throughout the days leading to the test.

Characters in To Kill a Mockingbird.

Jem: the brother, arm is broken, saved by Boo Radley.

Scout: narrator of the story, learns a lot about prejudice, growing up and courage.

Atticus: father and lawyer, defends Tom Robinson.


Calpurnia: maid, teaches the kids to write, a mother figure.

The TOP TEN Tips for Test Taking

- 1. Use the TRIAGE METHOD
- look through the test and divide the questions into the following categories (write the symbol beside each question)
- PROBABLE questions you can easily answer
- ✓ POSSIBLE questions you think you can work out the answer to LONG SHOTS- question you have no idea how to answer


ANSWER IN THIS ORDER:

- 2. Be relaxed. The best way to feel relaxed for a test is to BE PREPARED.
- 3. <u>Review the test</u> after you have finished attempting all the questions. Look for spelling or grammatical errors and review your answers.
- 4. Essay Questions
- read the question VERY carefully
- brainstorm and make a quick outline
- write the essay
- read the essay over once you have finished



The break down: 30% planning and thinking, 60% writing and 10% proof reading.

5. Multiple Choice Questions and Short Answer Questions

Multiple Choice: Read the question and all possible answers VERY CAREFULLY. Cross out the wrong answers and pick the BEST ANSWER.

Short Answer Questions:

- 1. Read the questions carefully.
- 2. Look at the amount of marks allocated and make sure you have enough evidence in your answer.

6. KNOW 'TEST' WORDS

Compare: How two things are similar and different.

Contrast: To show how two things are different.

Define: Give meaning and example of a concept.

Describe: Explain how something looks or works.

Explain: Give an understanding of how and why of a concept.

List: Give examples in a series.

Summarize: Give the main and important facts about a subject.

Illustrate: Explain using a figure, picture or a concrete example.

Outline: Give a description organized with main ideas and proof.

- 7. Math Problems
- a) Estimate what the answer might be.
- b) Try and draw a picture to help you understand.
- c) Show all of your work! Even if your answer is wrong you might be on the right track!
